### TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The Trustees present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of the Charity for the year 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022. The Annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the Charity qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

#### Objectives and activities

### a. Policies and objectives

The Charity's purpose as set out in the objects contained in the Organisation's Memorandum of Association is to:

- help relieve the suffering and distress of persons who have been raped or sexually abused and;
- advance the education of the public in the subject of rape and sexual abuse and their effects.

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

### b. Strategies for achieving objectives

The aims of the Charity, which fully reflect the purpose that the Charity was set up to further, are;

- to reduce the impact of rape and sexual abuse on victims and their families;
- to encourage reporting of rape and sexual abuse;
- · to support victims through the legal process and;
- to reduce the incidence of rape and sexual abuse by raising awareness.

The Charity's key message, which is promoted throughout SV2's work is that

Sexual violence simply shouldn't exist and no one should deal with it alone. Whilst sexual abuse exists, we'll be here to support and empower the victims, inform the public and protect future generations.

These are reflected in the Charity's Business Plan 2019-22, which was completed in-year.

### Objectives and activities (continued)

### c. Activities undertaken to achieve objectives and further the Charity's purposes for the public benefit

To achieve our objectives and deliver public benefit, the Charity delivers a range of support services to victims and survivors. This includes:

- practical and emotional support in the aftermath of a sexual assault, whether or not the crime has been reported, from our experienced, independent sexual violence advisors (ISVAs) for both adults and children
- emotional support to deal with the impacts of trauma, whenever the abuse happened, from our accredited therapy service for people of all ages
- holistic and peer-based support through groups and alternative therapies
- work to prevent sexual abuse and assault through our prevention and education programmes in education, health and social care and across the private and voluntary sectors

SV2 is governed by a Board of Trustees, which oversees the work of the Charity ensuring that it is operating within the guidelines set by the Charity Commission. The Charity is recognised as an experienced provider of specialist services to victims of sexual violence across the city and county by statutory agencies such as Derbyshire Constabulary, the Police & Crime Commissioner, local authorities and NHS England, as well as other charitable organisations. Reflecting our commitment to quality, our services are externally accredited by Lime Culture and BACP, including our specialist work with children and young people.

### d. Social investment and grant-making policies

The Charity does not deliver social investment, nor does it make grants.

#### e. Volunteers

Currently, the organisation does not make use of volunteers, other than those completing placements as part of a qualification in therapy or counselling. In 2021-22 there were 2 volunteers.

### Achievements and performance

### a. Main achievements of the Charity and Key performance indicators

Following lower than usual referrals and activity levels in 2020-21 the charity has seen a sustained increase in activity, in line with the surge that was beginning at the end of 2020-21. In 2021-22 there were:

- 712 (709 (previous year) open cases as at 1st April 2021,
- 2,621 (previous year 1,363) new referrals. This includes 437 duplicate referrals which were allocated to the same case, leading to 2,184 new cases created)
- 1,435 (previous year 1,243) cases closed during the same period
- 1,461 cases open on 1st April 2022

For those clients who preferred in person support or where virtual support was impossible, including very young children, this resulted in a backlog of cases and much longer waits than usual when we began offering in person support in summer 2021. These have now largely been resolved, with a return to more usual waits for support despite increases in referrals.

The Charity's Senior Management Team remains well embedded in local strategic partnership forums and enjoys a positive relationship with a number of statutory and non-statutory agencies across the County. The CEO has participated in work to develop the new Victims Bill and Victim Funding Strategy, and in implementation of Rape Review responses. The Senior Management Team is currently active in the new partnership structures in the County which meet the requirements of the national reviews, and are working more closely with Health colleagues and those across the voluntary, community and social enterprise sector as the Integrated Care agenda moves forward at pace.

### b. Review of activities

### Counselling/Therapy Services

Long-term, sustainable funding for therapeutic services, particularly for adults, has been challenging throughout SV2's history. Due to delays in awarding ongoing funding by National Lottery Community Fund, Derby and Derbyshire Clinical Commissioning Group stepped in and provided funding for adult therapy services for one year from April 2021, via Derbyshire's Police & Crime Commissioner. This was primarily for short-term (8-10 week) therapies. The Ministry of Justice also fund therapeutic services for all ages, with a focus on supporting clients in the more rural areas of the county.

As demand grew, so did the waiting list, with over 170 adults and 80 children and young people awaiting therapy on 1st April 2022.

The Charity secured a substantial National Lottery Community Fund grant in year, to start from 1st April 2022 supporting people from the age of 14. The excellent work of the team and ongoing high levels of demand enabled the senior management team to demonstrate ongoing need for funding for specialist therapies to the CCG team, resulting in an additional contract for services with the CCG from 1st April 2022, for another year, and a commitment to developing an ongoing pathway for these supports. This will facilitate progress towards sustainable, statutory funding for these supports.

Therapy services were delivered primarily remotely until August 2021. As in person services began to be offered, we identified that around 40% of therapy clients continued to want to engage virtually, enabling the development of a hybrid offer.

Reducing restrictions enabled more clients to access taster sessions for holistic therapies including trauma informed yoga and Reiki.

#### Achievements and performance (continued)

SV2's Children in Need funded art therapy service for 0-13 year olds is always in high demand, with a large waiting list developing between March 2020 and August 2021. This was due to the very small number of young people able to engage virtually. Support was provided to parents and carers throughout this time, and the backlog has now been cleared and waiting lists reduced.

The Charity is also a sub-contractor to the regional Paediatric SARC service provided by Nottingham University Hospitals and provides up to 10 sessions of therapeutic support to children aged 17 and under.

SV2 was able to complement these services and enable self-referrals from 14-17 year olds by utilising Ministry of Justice funding.

### Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC)

Millfield House is Derby & Derbyshire's Adult Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC) and is funded by NHS England, Derbyshire Constabulary, Derbyshire's Police & Crime Commissioner (PCC) and Derbyshire County Council. Crisis Workers provide 24/7 support to victims through forensic medical examinations, whether or not the victim has initiated police involvement. Clients are then supported by Crisis Workers to access follow on support from SV2's other services, and from additional health and social care providers.

The SARC houses SV2's Advice Line which operated during Monday to Friday 8am to 5pm and on weekends and Bank Holidays between 8am and 5pm from an on-call Crisis Worker up to 24.01.2021. As of 25.01.2021 the Advice Line is operational 24hrs per day, 7 days a week, including bank holidays. The Advice Line is utilised by members of the public and professionals from other organisations seeking specialist advice.

Mountain Healthcare Limited (MHL) provide the forensic medical examination service and are registered with the Care Quality Commission to provide this. They had the first inspection of the SARC service in December 2021. This resulted in a positive report with no actions required.

Due to the increasing regulatory, inspection and compliance requirements relating to SARC provision, coupled with commissioners' decisions to commission the SARC as a single combined service from March 2023, Trustees and Senior Management made the decision that SV2 could not realistically provide the service under this model and would therefore not re-tender for this provision and would step away from the SARC in March 2023. The focus from March 2022 is the delivery of an effective exit plan whilst supporting staff through a period of significant change and uncertainty.

### Independent Sexual Violence Advisors (ISVAs) and Children's Independent Sexual Violence Advisors (ChISVAs)

The ISVAs and ChISVAs provide practical and emotional support to anyone who has experienced sexual abuse, whether or not they have reported the crime to the police. The team provide support in person at our bases and in the community, especially in schools, alongside remote support. As pandemic related restrictions were relaxed, we found that most young people have wanted to return to in person support, however the picture is much more mixed for adults, so we now offer a hybrid service which meets client needs best.

ISVAs have experienced a significant rise in complex cases and safeguarding with clients struggling to cope with the effects of their sexual assault or abuse alongside pandemic-related restrictions on broader life. In addition Children's ISVAs have seen an increase in support requirements from young people with additional needs and disabilities, which requires a more integrated multi-agency approach.

### Achievements and performance (continued)

ISVAs also offer support through complex and demanding criminal justice processes, at court during a trial and in supporting claims for Criminal Injuries Compensation. The delays reported in our last report relating to the court system have continued to worsen, with some victims now waiting up to five years for their case to be heard. This has had a significant impact on their health and wellbeing. The issue has been raised at local, regional and national level with the Police and Crime Commissioner, Ministry of Justice, Crown Prosecution and Her Majesty's Courts and Tribunal Service but no immediate solutions are available.

During 2020 the Charity secured funding from the Ministry of Justice to develop an ISVA service supporting the prison estate in Derbyshire at HMP Foston and HMP Sudbury. This was a proof of concept pilot with funding for the post until March 2022 dependent upon positive outcomes from the pilot. The service has been running in both prisons since early 2022 following multiple setbacks related to the pandemic.

Derbyshire's Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) together with Derbyshire County Council funds the County's ChISVA and ISVA services.

#### **Prevention and Education Services**

The CORE contract also included prevention and education work and supported by a part-time Learning & Development Officer post. This post has been developing and delivering training and awareness sessions to a range of multi-agency professionals as set out in the table below. During the pandemic much of the training has been delivered virtually and some training has not been able to progress.

The L&D Officer's work also includes development of e-learning modules for teaching staff to develop their confidence in delivering Government mandated 'healthy relationships' lessons. Their greatest success in 2021-22 has been the development and roll out of our CONSENT workshops for year 9 and over students, which reached over 2,500 young people across 12 schools, colleges and universities, primarily during the latter half of the year.

### Achievements and performance (continued)

Following cessation of funding for our Learning and Development post in March 2021, SV2's Board of Trustees agreed with the Senior Management Team that this post provides valuable training and awareness raising for multiple agencies as part of prevention and education work in this field and agreed to fund the post for a further 12 months until March 2022 whilst another source of funding is found. Three year funding was secured in May 2022 for a significant increase in both Learning and Development and Community Development Funding, based on the evidence developed over the previous 12 months.

### Who Used SV2's Services?

The Charity's services are provided to residents of Derbyshire (including Derby City) regardless or where or when the assault occurred and to non-residents who are assaulted in Derbyshire. Below is a summary of SV2s clients for 2021-22. Numbers in brackets are for 2020-21.

We also supported 46 secondary survivors, who were supporting a loved one who had been sexually abused. This was primarily made up of parents and carers.

The remainder of clients supported do not have a specific incident recorded.

### **Impact of Activities**

Safeguarding clients, who often present with complex mental health conditions, is key to the support the Charity provides. Rapid assessment of client risk and needs is therefore paramount. Following restructure in 2020 the Single Point of Access (SPOA) role is now well established, with the sole purpose of undertaking initial assessments for all new referrals. This enables clients to be assessed and, where additional support is required before accessing our services, referred directly to appropriate providers, such as IAPT.

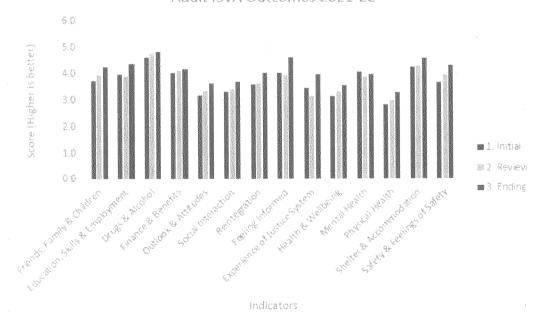

### Achievements and performance (continued)

To understand and demonstrate the difference our support makes SV2 utilises a RADAR risk and needs assessment tool across all services which is designed to identify any risks and capture a client's needs at three stages; the initial assessment, at a review stage and on ending support. Clients are asked to self-assess using a 0-5 scale (0 is the worst and 5 is the best) against the following categories to ensure their support is tailored to their unique needs:

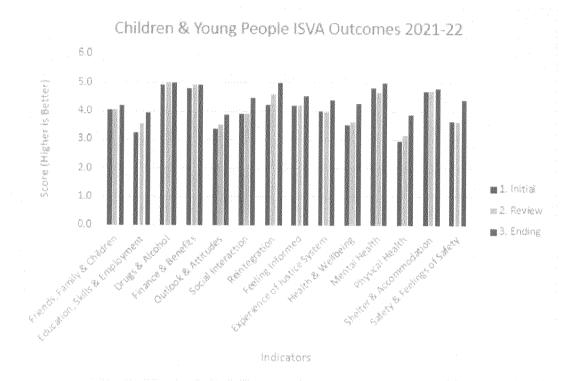

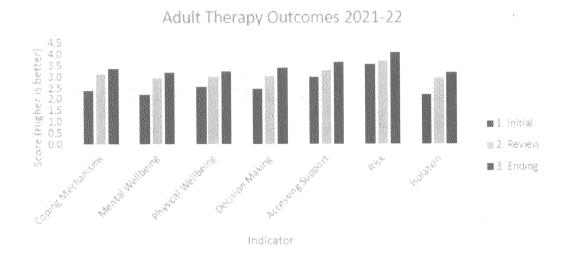

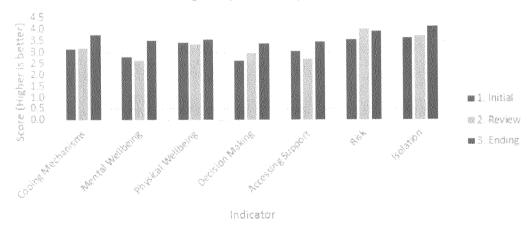
In addition, therapy services capture wider therapeutic outcomes by using the CORE34 mental health assessment tool. Following award of NHS funding for therapy for the first time in 2021-22 SV2's therapy team have introduced the General Anxiety Disorder (GAD-7) and Patient Health Questionnaire (PHQ-9) tools to enable the identification of improvements in wellbeing over shorter periods of therapy. This has also enabled senior managers to more effectively demonstrate the significant complexity of the Charity's therapy client base to commissioners and funders.

### Children & Young People Therapy Outcomes 2021-22



Assessments are completed with clients within the first or second session of support. A much higher number of assessments are completed than review and ending sessions as support can be provided over a long period. Over this time, clients may disengage from support, be referred to more appropriate service or no longer require support, so it is not always possible to book a planned ending session. Pandemic related challenges in resourcing for other services has challenged effective endings for some clients.

#### c. Factors relevant to achieve objectives

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to have far-reaching impacts on SV2 during 2021-22. The Charity continued to adapt to new ways of working, delivering all services effectively and safely throughout the year. SV2's services, with the exception of the Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC), continued to be delivered primarily via virtual meetings, telephone and text until August 2021, when a cautious and planned return to in person working began. The pandemic has resulted in a long-lasting change to the Charity's ways of working, as clients continue to seek remote and video support in addition to traditional in person support. This has been supported by further investment in technology over the year, which also enables the staff and management team to work more effectively and maintain connections whilst physically apart.

As we move into a "new normal" of hybrid working and service delivery the Trustees continue to be proud of the staff and management team for continuing to provide much needed services to vulnerable people over the whole period and are keen to ensure the health and wellbeing of staff. A number of measures have been implemented over the course of the year including regular team check-ins, stress assessments and access to therapy. Subsequently, the Charity has introduced an Employee Assistance Programme providing direct access to therapy and other support 24/7, 365 days of the year.

COVID funding received during 2020-21 was largely spent by early 2021, and delays in award for "business as usual" funding, including from National Lottery Community Fund, meant that alternative sources of funding needed to be sought for some services. This has resulted in a strong relationship with the local Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and an ongoing commitment to specialist support services for survivors of sexual abuse.

### d. Fundraising activities and income generation

The Charity does not proactively seek donations from the public, and is largely funded by statutory grants, grants from grant-making trusts and foundations and public-sector contracts. No specific expenditure is linked to the generation of income in year.

### e. Investment policy and performance

SV2 holds no investments, therefore does not currently have investment policies. Before any are made, the Board will ratify an appropriate policy.

### Financial review

### a. Financial review including principal risks

SV2's financial position in 2021-22 was positive due to additional funding secured to deliver additional services, including brand new income streams. In total SV2's income for 2021-2022 reached just over £1million for the second year running, a situation which looks set to continue into 2022-23. SV2 has therefore now entered into a contract with audit partners.

SV2's financial position is relatively optimistic, considering the inherently short-term nature of many sexual abuse related funding streams.

The greatest risk is the split of the SARC and Adult ISVA contract in April 2023. The model for commissioning and regulating SARC services has changed. Due to the level of clinical regulation, from both the Care Quality Commission and UKAS, and the move to commission the forensic medical service as part of the SARC contract, SV2 are no longer able to deliver this type of service.

The focus is therefore on securing contracts for both the ISVA and ChISVA services with the Police and Crime Commissioner. Other ISVA funding to cover 3 posts has been secured to March 2025, mitigating this risk somewhat.

Therapy has the potential for significant growth in funding over the coming years. Following significant delays, National Lottery Community Fund awarded us a substantial grant for therapeutic services from April 2022 – March 2025. In addition, CCG funding via is secured until March 2023, as is Ministry of Justice funding via the Rape Support Fund.

The recommissioning of the Rape Support Fund, and a national commitment to continued increases in funding for specialist support services for victims of sexual abuse, provide additional opportunities to develop our services.

Children in Need funding for supporting 0-13 year olds with art therapy is secured until January 2023 and discussions are ongoing about new funding bids.

SV2 is a sub-contractor to the regional Paediatric SARC provider Nottingham University Hospitals (NUH) providing therapeutic support until March 2023 and has already indicated to NUH that it would support an NUH bid for a new contract to continue the same service thereafter.

Prevention funding from the Ministry of Justice is secure to March 2025, providing a strong platform for the growth and development of these services.

Following the end of core funding from The Henry Smith Charity in 2020, the Charity secured two years of unrestricted funding from Lloyd's Bank foundation in December 2021. This is welcome, however the continued growth of the charity means that such funding is unlikely to be repeatable from 2024 onwards.

The Charity received direct donations and donations via fundraising to the value of £1,847 in 2021-22.

### b. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

### c. Reserves policy

The Directors have set a reserves policy which requires:

- Reserves be maintained at a level which ensures that SV2's core activity could continue for 3 to 6
  months during a period of unforeseen difficulty.
- A proportion of reserves be maintained in a readily realisable form.

  The calculation of the required level of reserves is an integral part of the organisation's planning, budget and forecast cycle.

### It takes into account:

- · Risks associated with each stream of income and expenditure being different from that budgeted
- Planned activity level
- The organisation's commitments

The amount of restricted funds at 31.03.2022 totalled £71,514 which are allocated to future budget commitments.

The amount of unrestricted funds at 31.03.2022 totalled £74,820 which will be held to settle any future outstanding liabilities should any funding be at risk.

Total restricted and unrestricted reserves at 31.03.2022 are £146,334. Free reserves at 31.03.2022 was £56.070.

### d. Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Charity has adopted robust policies to mitigate financial risk. These are reviewed biennially and ratified by the Board of Trustees. This includes a robust Reserves policy and a delegation of authority which ensures that the Board of Trustees have appropriate oversight of our finances. As with all risks, financial risks are identified on our organisational Risk Register, which is reviewed monthly by the CEO and shared with Trustees for their oversight.

### e. Principal funding

### Structure, governance and management

### a. Governing document

The company is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated and registered as a charity. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

No changes were made to the articles during 2021-22.

### b. Recruitment and appointment of the management committee

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members are elected to serve for a period of one year after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

All members of the Management Committee give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the Charity.

Relevant business and professional skills are generally well represented on the management committee and one new member joined the Committee in 2021-22, with a therapeutic background which has filled an identified gap in knowledge and skills.

During 2021 one Trustee, left the Charity after nearly 7 years of service.

### c. Organisational structure and decision-making policies

The Charity's Management Committee is made up of up to 15 members who meet bi-monthly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the Charity, at present the Committee has six members.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of services and budget management rests with the Chief Executive along with two Heads of Service. The Chief Executive is responsible for ensuring that the Charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met. The Heads of Service have responsibility for overseeing the day to day operational management of the Charity's business, individual supervision of the staff team and also ensuring that the team continues to develop its skills and working practices in line with good practice.

### d. Trustee induction and Training

Trustees are encouraged to attend both offices to familiarise themselves with the practical work of the charity. All Trustees are provided with a copy of the Charity Commission's publication "The Essential Trustee". Trustees are also invited to participate in training delivered to staff wherever possible, such as safeguarding training. The Management Committee's Clerk retains a record of the Trustee's training.

### e. Pay policy for key management personnel

The Charity's remuneration policy complies with the Equality Act 2010 and other relevant legislation. Remuneration for key management personnel is set by a combination of affordability and market testing. Pay uplifts are considered separately to those applied to all other staff.

### f. Related party relationships

There are no related party relationships which pertain to key management personnel or any member of the Management Committee. The Management Committee's Clerk maintains a register of interests and a Trustee Conflicts of Interest Policy.

### g. Risk management

SV2's Business Plan 2019-2021 was agreed by the Management Committee in January 2019 outlining the future direction of the Charity. A regularly updated risk register is considered by the Trustees at each bi-monthly meeting together with updates on the progress of the Business Plan. Risks are mitigated as far as possible.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

#### Plans for future periods

SV2's Business Plan for 2022-2025 was signed off by the Board of Trustees in March 2022. This outlines The Charity's plans to develop and thrive throughout a period of change. The key priorities of this Business Plan are to establish the organisation as:

- The highest quality, best value provider of services to all victims and survivors of sexual abuse.
- The go-to partner for agencies, companies and organisations across Derbyshire and the wider region who want to improve their response to sexual abuse.
- The best place to work or volunteer for people who want to support those with experience of sexual abuse.
- An innovator in the sector, developing new services for survivors and victims, professionals and other
  partners, which empower people and proactively prevent sexual abuse in the future.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

#### 1. General information

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office and principal place of business is Millfield House, Hall Street, Alfreton, Derbyshire, DE55 7BU. The financial statements are presented in sterling (£) and are rounded to the nearest £1.

### 2. Accounting policies

### 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

SV2 - Supporting Victims Of Sexual Violence Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

### 2.2 Going concern

After making enquires, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charitable Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The Charitable Company therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

### 2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are recognised when the Charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the Charity beofre the Charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the Charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid is recognised at the time of the donation.

Interest received is recognised once the interest is declared and notified as being receivable.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charity's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

#### 2.5 Taxation

The Charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

### 2.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of tangible fixed assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

### 2.7 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### 2.8 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

### 2.9 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the Statement of financial activities as a finance cost.

#### 2.10 Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 2.11 Pensions

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the Charity to the fund in respect of the year.

### 2.12 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

### 3. Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The Charity makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. There are no estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

All SV2's services are in service of the charity's objectives, to relieve the suffering and distress of people who have been raped or sexually abused and to advance the education of the public in the subject of rape and sexual abuse and their effects.

### NHS Derby & Derbyshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG)

Therapy for clients aged 14-17. A fund that was secured in 2015/16 for that year, however the fund was underspent due to low uptake, the underspend was carried over year on year and was exhausted in 2021/22. The fund was used mainly for Sub Contracted Therapists and manager support.

### NHS England (SARC)

SV2 are Derbyshire's Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC) contracted provider of services, 2021/22 is year 4 of 5 of the current contract, however SV2 have managed the SARC for many years, actually since its opening in the early 2000's. This includes running the SARC, supporting clients through their medical by way of providing a Crisis Worker then providing an Independent Sexual Violence Advocate (ISVA) to support them through the court process and give practical support. The contract also covers overheads for both staff and business.

### Cosmopolitan

The magazine Cosmopolitan raised funds and donated them to SV2. This was to provide the clients with new clothing and toiletries after their medical examination at the SARC.

### Children in Need (CiN)

Therapy for clients aged 0-13. Children in Need have been supporting SV2 for many years, they provide funding for the counsellor and their overheads.

### **National Lottery Community Fund (NLCF)**

Therapy for clients aged 14-17 and 18+ and some staff and business overheads. This is SV2's 5th successful National Lottery Community Fund (NLCF) grant, the funding was to be used from 2017-20, however NLCF also provided Covid support but also paused the option to bid for new projects and so the original end date of Sep 2020 was extended. All the funds were spent by March 2022. SV2 have been successful in a 6th NLCF grant which started 1st April 2022.

### Police & Crime Commissioner (PCC) - ChISVA

A direct contract with Derbyshire's PCC, 2021/22 is year 4 of 5. This contract provides Independent Sexual Violence Advocate (ISVA) support to children and covers some staff overheads.

### Nottingham University Hospitals (NUH)

A direct contract with NUH, 2021/22 is year 4 of 5. This provides therapy to children that have been referred to SV2 from the Pediatric Sexual Assault Referral Centre (PSARC) and covers some staff and management overheads.

### Ministry of Justice (MoJ)

A direct grant from MoJ which provides therapy for all ages and our hub at Buxton, together with staff overheads and business overheads.

### Police & Crime Commissioner - Prison ISVA (PrISVA)

An MoJ grant paid via PCC, this was a new grant prior year which took a while to take off. This provides an ISVA service for inmates at Foston & Sudbury Prisions

### Police & Crime Commissioner -ChISVA/ISVA

An MoJ grant paid via PCC, this is a new grant this year. It gives SV2 the funds to provide an extra ISVA who support adults and children.

### Police & Crime Commissioner - CCG Therapy

A Derby & Derbyshire CCG grant paid via PCC. A new fund this year, a one off pot to help support SV2's therapy service during the year whilst a new NLCF bid was being submitted. The funding provides therapy to adults with some staff and business overheads.

### **NHS England Covid**

A fund of £84k was awarded during covid for 2020/21 to provide therapy and ChISVA service to tackle the surge in clients over the covid period. The £84k wasn't all called for in 2020/21 so NHSE agreed for SV2 to call up the remainder of the funding in 2021/22.

### Lloyds Bank Foundation

A new £50k grant awarded in Late November 2021, which started in December 2021. The funding is for 2 years at £25k per year. This Designated Reserve will be used to support activities or costs that further SV2's charitable purpose. Some of the fund has been used in 2021/22 to cover audit fees.
